

## **Lobbying Compliance Checklist for New York City Nonprofits**

Nonprofit organizations that engage in lobbying in New York must pay attention to federal limits on lobbying activity and to federal, state and local lobbying disclosure requirements. This checklist may be used to determine whether an advocacy activity might trigger one or more reporting requirements. Engaged in a significant amount of advocacy before Congress, federal executive branch officials, or federal administrative agencies	Determine whether the amount and type of advocacy requires registration as a lobbyist under the <b>federal Lobbying Disclosure Act</b>	Federal government lobbying only
Advocating to a city or state official or government entity in New York State to enact or change law (including the NYS or NYC budget), executive order, regulation, agency practice, ratemaking, zoning, procurement, disposition of NYC's real property, agency or legislative hearing agenda	Determine whether the amount and type of advocacy require registration & reporting as a lobbyist and/or client under the NYS Lobbying Act and NYC Lobbying Law	See below for obligations of registered lobbyists & clients.
	If advocacy by an organization that is not a 501(c)(3) occurs during the run-up to an election and is aimed at a public official who is running for office: determine whether it counts as a reportable independent expenditure under NYC Campaign Finance Board rules, NYS Board of Election rules, or NY Attorney General Regulation 13 NYCRR 91.6

	Consider whether organization needs to submit <b>Source of Funding Report</b> to JCOPE: applies to lobbying client that spends \$50k+ in 12 months on lobbying, constituting at least 3% of organization's total expenditures.	501(c)(3) organizations registered with the Charities Bureau are exempt
